Dangers of Professionalization:

- Increased accountability.
- Increased workload .
- Lack of **compensation**.
- Increased monitoring of teachers' work.



Towards a New Perspective on Teacher Professionalism




'unlike doctors and lawyers, as teachers we hand over the knowledge and skills we have to our learners... the teacher-student relation lies at the heart of education, whereas one could argue that the lawyer-client relation, for instance, is less moral and more instrumental in character' (Johnston, 2003, p. 85)



'Teaching may seek the respect it deserves not by comparing itself to other vocations, but by focusing on the role and importance of teachers' **moral** and **intellectual commitments** in the lives of students and in society'(1993 in Campbell, 2003: 3).
